3 stars: Hendrick Smithfield *** 1,2 km from Brunel about 155-212-euro incl. breakfast

3 stars: Easy The hotel Dublin *** 1 km from Brunel - about 130-160 euro - no breakfast available at this hotel

3 stars: Phoenix Park hotel*** 410 meter about 113-130 euro breakfast not included but available by additional booking in the hotel


